N.J.S.A. 9:2-4c:

- 1. THE PARENTS' ABILITY TO AGREE, COMMUNICATE AND COOPERATE IN MATTERS RELATING TO THE CHILD.
- 2. THE PARENTS' WILLINGNESS TO ACCEPT CUSTODY.
- 3. ANY HISTORY OF UNWILLINGNESS TO ALLOW VISITATION NOT BASED ON SUBSTANTIATED ABUSE
- 4. THE INTERACTION AND RELATIONSHIP OF THE CHILD WITH ITS PARENTS AND SIBLINGS.
- 5. THE HISTORY OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, IF ANY.
- 6. THE SAFETY OF THE CHILD.
- 7. THE SAFETY OF EITHER PARENT FROM PHYSICAL ABUSE BY THE OTHER PARTY.
- 8. THE PREFERENCE OF THE CHILD WHEN OF SUFFICIENT AGE AND CAPACITY TO REASON SO AS TO FORM AN INTELLIGENT DECISION.
- 9. THE NEIDS OF THE CHILD.
- 10. THE STABILITY OF THE HOME ENVIRONMENT OFFERED.
- 11. THE QUALITY AND CONTINUITY OF THE CHILD'S EDUCATION.
- 12. THE FITNESS OF THE PARENTS.
- 13. THE GEOGRAPHIC PROXIMITY OF THE PARENTS' ECMES.
- 14. THE RITHET AND QUALITY OF THE TIME SPENT WITH THE CHILD PRIOR TO OR SUBSEQUENT TO THE SEPARATION.

GRANDPARENT/SIBLING VISITATION

N.J.S.A. 9:2-7.1(b)

- 1. THE RELATIONSHIP BETHERN THE CHILD AND THE APPLICANT.
- 2. THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN FACE OF THE CHILD'S PARENTS OR THE PERSON WITH HEOM THE CHILD IS RESIDING AND THE APPLICANT.
- 3. THE TIME WHICH HAS ELAPSED SINCE THE CHILD-LAST HAD CONTACT WITH THE APPLICANT.
- 4. THE EFFECT TEAT SUCH VISITATION WILL HAVE ON THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE CHILD AND THE CHILD'S PARENTS OR THE PERSON WITH WHOM THE CHILD IS RESIDING.
- 5. IF THE PARENTS ARE DIVORCED ON SEPARATED, THE TIME SEARING ARRANGEMENT WHICH EXISTS BETWEEN THE PARENTS WITH REGIRD TO THE CHILD.
- 6. THE GOOD FAITH OF THE APPLICANT IN FILING THE APPLICATION.
- 7. ANY HISTORY OF PHISICAL, EMOTIONAL OR SEXUAL ABUSE OR NEGLECT BY THE APPLICANT.
- 8. ANI OTHER FACTOR RELEVANT TO THE BEST INTERESTS OF THE CHILD.
- N.J.S.A. 9:2-7.1(c) It shall be prime facie evidence that visitation is in the child's best interest if the applicant had, in the past, been a full-time caretaker for the child.

EQUITABLE DISTRIBUTION

N.J.S.L. 23:34-23.1:

- 1. THE DURATION OF THE MARRIAGE.
- 2. THE AGE AND PHYSICAL AND EMOTIONAL HEALTS OF THE PARTIES.
- 3. THE INCOME OR PROPERTY BROUGHT TO THE MARRIAGE BY EACH PARTY.
- 4. THE STANDARD OF LIVING ESTABLISHED DURING THE MARRIAGE.
- 5. Any written agreement hade by parties before or during the Marriage concerning an arrangement of Property Distribution.
- 6. THE ECONOMIC CIRCUMSTANCES OF EACH PARTY AT THE TIME THE DIVISION OF PROPERTY DECOMES EFFECTIVE.
- 7. THE INCOME AND EARNING CAPACITY OF EACH PARTY, INCLUDING EDUCATIONAL BACKGROUND, TRAINING, EMPLOYMENT SKILLS, NORK EXPERIENCE, LENGTH OF ABSENCE FROM THE JOB MARKET, CUSTODIAL RESPONSIBILITIES FOR CHILDREN, AND THE TIME AND EXPENSE HECESSARI TO ACQUIRE SUFFICIENT EDUCATION OR TRAINING TO ENABLE THE PARTY TO BECOME SELF-SUPPORTING AT A STANDARD OF LIVING REASONABLY COMPARABLE TO THAT ENJOYED DURING THE MARRIAGE.
- S. THE CONTRIBUTION BY EACH PARTY TO THE EDUCATION, TRAINING OR EARNING POWER OF THE OTHER.
- P. THE CONTRIBUTION OF EACH PARTY TO THE ACQUISITION, DISSI-PATION, PRESERVATION, DEPRECIATION OR APPRECIATION IN THE AMOUNT OR VALUE OF THE MARITAL PROPERTY, AS WELL AS THE CONTRIBUTION OF A PARTY AS A HOMEMAKER.
- 10. THE TAX CONSEQUENCES OF THE PROPOSED DISTRIBUTION TO EACH.
- 11. THE PRESENT, VALUE OF THE PROPERTY.
- 12. THE HEED OF A PARENT HHO HAS PHYSICAL CUSTODY OF A CHILD TO OHN OR OCCUPY THE MARITAL RESIDENCE AND TO USE OR OHN THE HOUSEHOLD EFFECTS.
- 13. THE DEBTS AND LIABILITIES OF THE PARFIES.
- 14. THE HEED FOR CREATION, NOW OR IN THE FUTURE, OF A TRUST FUND TO SECURE REASONABLY FORESEEABLE MEDICAL OR EUGCATIONAL COSTS FOR A SPOUSE OR CHILDREN.
- 15. ANY OTHER PACTORS HEICH THE COURT HAY DEEN RELEVANT.

N.J.B.A. 2A:34-23(b):

- 3. ALL SOURCES OF INCOME AND ASSETS OF EACE PARENT.
- 4. EARNING ABILITY OF EACH PARENT, INCLUDING EDUCATIONAL BACKGROUND, TRAINING, EMPLOYMENT SKILLS, WORK EXPERIENCE, CUSTODIAL RESPONSIBILITY FOR CHILDREN INCLUDING THE COST OF FROVIDING CARE AND THE LENGTH OF TIME AND COST OF EACH PARENT TO OSTAIN TRAINING OR EXPERIENCE FOR APPROPRIATE EMPLOYMENT.
- 5. NEED AND CAPACITY OF THE CHILD FOR EDUCATION, INCLUDING HIGHER EDUCATION.
- 6. AGE AND HEALTH OF THE CHILD AND EACH PARENT.
- 7. INCOME, ASSETS AND FARMING ABILITY OF THE CHILD.

NEWBURGE V. ARRIGO, 88 N.J. 529, 545 (1982):

- 1. WHETHER THE PARENT, IF STILL LIVING WITH THE CHILD, HOULD HAVE CONTRIBUTED TOWARD THE COSTS OF THE REQUESTED HIGHER EDUCATION.
- 2. THE EFFECT OF THE HACKGROUND, VALUES, AND GOALS OF THE PARENT ON THE REASONABLENESS OF THE EXPECTATION OF CHILD FOR HIGHER EDUCATION.
- 3. THE AMOUNT OF THE CONTRIBUTION SOUGHT BY THE CHILD FOR THE COST OF HIGHER EDUCATION.
- 4'. THE ABILITY OF THE PARINT TO PAY THAT COST.
- 5. THE RELATIONSHIP OF THE REQUESTED CONTRIBUTION TO THE KIND OF SCHOOL OR COURSE OF STUDY SOUGHT BY THE CHILD.
- 6. THE FINANCIAL RESOURCES OF BOTH PARTIES.
- 7. THE COMMITMENT TO AND APTITUDE OF THE CHILD FOR THE REQUESTED EDUCATION.
- 3. THE FINANCIAL RESOURCES OF THE CHILD, INCLUDING ASSETS OWNED INDIVIDUALLY OR HELD IN CUSTODIANSHIP OR TRUST.
- 9. THE ABILITY OF THE CHILD TO EARN INCOME DURING THE SCHOOL YEAR OR ON VACATION.
- 10. THE AVAILABILITY OF FINANCIAL AID IN THE FORM OF COLLEGE GRANTS AND LOAMS.
- 11. THE CHILD'S RELATIONSHIP TO THE PAYING PARENT, INCLUDING MUTUAL AFFECTION AND SHARED GOALS AS WELL AS RESPONSIVE-NESS TO PARENTAL ADVICE AND GUIDANCE.
- 12. THE RELATIONSHIP OF THE EDUCATION REQUESTED TO ANY PRIOR TRAINING AND TO THE OVERALL LONG-RANGE GOALS OF THE CHILD.

NOTE: Where there are unemancipated children under age 18, in addition to the college student(s), the Child.

Support Guidelines shall be first applied as to said unemancipated children, before determining the college contribution and any child support obligation as to the college student.
